Purpose

To provide a directed course of spiritual development and ministerial preparation through both a combination of academic study and field experience for those who want to take the next step in the exploration of their faith and/or preparation for any type of ministry in the Christian tradition.

Program

- The program will be administered by staff and guest pastors and teachers and overseen by the board of theeffect.
- 2. The School is designed to provide whatever level of training the learner desires, and can be tailored for specific needs. Learners can elect to complete the entire curriculum, choose only courses of interest, or simply audit classes. In this way, the program is designed to train:
 - a. those who desire to know more about their faith, theology, and related subjects as part of a personal growth program
 - b. those who desire to work in ministerial areas and want to be as personally prepared as possible to be mentors, teachers, or pastors
 - c. those who wish to be considered for pastoral ordination
- 3. The School will operate in three areas of training:
 - a. Academic study—Based on a curriculum covering a wide spectrum of Christian thought, each student will create his or her own program based on that curriculum, working as much or as little as their needs and interests dictate--except for those interested in being considered for eventual ordination who are required to complete the entire curriculum. Courses will be a combination of directed independent study and actual classroom attendance, and most of the coursework can be completed entirely at the learner's own pace.
 - b. **Hands-on field ministries**—Recognizing that those who are truly called to pastoral ministry are already involved in ministerial work, ordination candidates are required to be actively involved in a ministerial field concurrent with their academic studies—all other learners are encouraged to do so as well.
 - c. **Spiritual mentoring/guidance**—Recognizing that intellectual understanding and field work can never substitute for genuine spiritual and emotional health, each ordination candidate will be required to select a pastoral mentor with whom to work a program of ongoing personal counseling and guidance. All learners are encouraged to do so as well.
- 4. The program's duration is approximately 2 years, but will vary depending on the learner's personal schedule and previous areas of development and study.
- 5. Pastoral candidates are required to submit a brief written paper containing a biographical sketch, a spiritual testimony, and plans/desires for future ministry. Candidates must also complete the "Extended Program" curriculum below.
- 6. Graduation from the School will be determined by the pastors and board of theeffect before any learner is considered for ordination. Completion of the program is a requirement, but not a guarantee of ordination. The pastors and board must unanimously recognize that the graduate also has a proven record of ongoing ministerial work and the necessary spiritual and emotional health for ordination.

It's important to note that this program is not accredited and is intended for personal growth or consideration for ordination at theeffect. If accredited classes are needed, referrals can be made for individual learners.



Academic Curriculum

Required Courses

The following courses are required for completion of the full curriculum.

1. Development and Transmission of Scripture

The story of the Bible: how it was written, by whom, when, methods of copying, translations, canonization, different textual families, concepts of inspiration, etc. Foundation for further study of Scripture. Course will consist of at least 4 classroom lectures/discussions and independent study.

2. Hermeneutics

Study of the art and science of Scriptural interpretation focusing on the rules of lexical-syntactical-historic approach—placing scripture in the context of the language, worldview, and time period in which it was written. Course will consist at least 2 classroom lectures/discussions and independent study.

3. Overview of Scripture

A look at the books of the bible, chronology, content, authorship, overall themes, different versions and translation methods for overall understanding of the Bible.

4. Jewish Studies

Placing Christianity, its central beliefs and interpretation of Scripture, back into the Jewish context from which it came. A look at the parting of the way between early Jewish followers of the Way and early Greek Christianity through the development of the Western church. Course will consist of at least 4 classroom lectures/discussions and independent study including the topics below.

5. New Testament Studies

A survey of the books of the New Testament, literary types, content, authorship, central themes and content. Course will consist of at least 3 to 4 classroom lectures/discussions and independent study, including the topics below as a focus.

No required text, other than the Bible, but good concordance and commentaries will be needed. Software approach such as E-Sword is excellent for study purposes see www.e-sword.net for details.

6. Old Testament Studies

A survey of the books of the Old Testament, literary types, content, authorship, central themes and content. Course will consist of at least 3 to 4 classroom lectures/discussions and independent study.

No required text, other than the Bible, but good concordance and commentaries will be needed. Software approach such as E-Sword is excellent for study purposes see www.e-sword.net for details.

7. Systematic Theology

A survey of the main themes of Christian theology including: doctrines concerning God, Christ, Holy Spirit, Angelology, Salvation, Sin, Church, Eschatology (last things). Course will consist of 3 to 4 classroom lectures/discussions and independent study.

8. Apocryphal, Pseudepigraphal, Gnostic Studies

Study of non-canonical books—those not included in the Bible, but written contemporaneously with the canonical books or in same general time periods. These books include the Apocryphal books included in Catholic and Eastern Orthodox bibles but not Protestant bibles, Jewish pseudipigraphal writings from the last centuries before Jesus' birth, and Christian Gnostic writings from the early church era. Course will consist of at least 2 classroom lectures/discussions and independent study.

9. Church History

Survey of the history of the church from the crucifixion through the Reformation. Course will consist of at least 2 classroom lectures/discussions and independent study.

10. Denominational Christianity

Study of the hundreds of Christian branches, denominations, and sects from the Reformation to present. Course will consist wholly of independent study.

11. Christian-Based Sects and Cults

Study of non-orthodox Christian sects and cults—their beliefs, history, and structure—including Latter Days Saints (Mormon), Jehovah's Witness, Unitarian, etc. Course will consist wholly of independent study.

12. Comparative Religions

Study of major world religions—their beliefs, history, and structure—their comparisons and contrasts to Christianity including a study of main theological worldviews. Course will consist of at least 2 classroom lectures/discussions and independent study.

13. Christian Spirituality

A survey of major themes and practice of Christian spirituality over the history of the church. Course will consist of at least 2 classroom lectures/discussions and independent study.

14. Pastoral/Lay Counseling

1. Evangelism

Practical study of methods of sharing fundamentals of Christian faith, discipling, mentoring. Course will consist of at least 2 classroom lectures/discussions and independent study.

Pastoral Candidate Program

Those who wish to be considered for ordination will also:

- Keep a journal containing entries related to spiritual growth. Entries in the journal should be made on a regular basis and shared regularly with directing pastors. Journal entries can serve both as discussion points for counseling and mentoring as well as reference for eventual consideration for ordination.
- 2. Select an area of special interest for in-depth emphasis.
- 3. Complete a bibliography of required reading and participate liberally in a bibliography of elective reading as part of curriculum.
- 4. Preach and teach publicly and complete two major written papers.
- 5. Be involved in field ministries of their choice throughout the program.
- 6. Select a pastor/mentor with whom to work a program of personal guidance/counseling.
